
We start each Sacred Time with the sign of the cross.




<u>Sign of the cross:</u> In the name of the Father, and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit. Amen.

In this passage Jesus flips the world upside down. We live in a time where we are told that we have to be the best, even if it means stepping on others to get there.


Jesus reminds us here that actually what is important is how we treat others. If we want to be at the top in God's kingdom, we have to put others first! Let us pray...

Day 3: Feast of St. Vincent de Paul



St. Vincent de Paul was born to a poor family in France (he lived near the river 'Paul' hence his name 'de Paul'/'of Paul'.

He became a Catholic priest in 1600. Not long after his ordination he was captured by pirates and sold into slavery.

He managed to covert his owner to Christianity and convinced him to help him get back to Paris. When he returned he became a helper to prisoners during the day and at night he would take to the streets of Paris and help the poor street children.

Day 3: Feast of St. Vincent de Paul

St. Vincent set up hospitals and schools to help the most needy. He dedicated his life to serving others and putting them first.

He later on had groups of women who wanted to help him in his work. He founded a group of nuns called the Lady's of Charity. Many other Vincentian organisations followed and still follow St. Vincent's example today.
