

Catholic Life at St Cuthbert's

Advent Service for Schools at the Liverpool Cathedral of Christ the King

Schools from across Liverpool Archdiocese were invited to attend an Advent service for young people at the Cathedral on Thursday 5th December. Our Chaplaincy Leaders represented St. Cuthbert's at this special event. Our students were treated to an afternoon of drama, music, reflections and readings. The service reminded us about the real meaning of Christmas and filled us with the joy, peace, love and hope of Advent.



As a part of our transition program at St Cuthbert's, all of our new year 7 students get to take a day away from their normal lessons and experience a retreat day. We welcomed Rise Theatre to school in November to lead a day called 'The Happiness Show'. Our students watched theatre productions and took part in workshops. Our students were encouraged to think about what makes them special, what is important to them and what will make them happy in their futures.





St. Cuthbert's Youth SVP Group

St. Vincent de Paul Society (SVP) is a national Catholic charity that aims to alleviate hardship in all its forms within local communities. Our own Youth SVP branch follows the mission of SVP by **seeing** where the need is – **thinking** what they can do – **doing** something to help.

St. Cuthbert's Youth SVP group recently attended a conference hosted by St. Helens Youth Parliament called 'Feed the Need'. 

You may have seen us around school or presenting at Awards Evening or being a part of many school activities. We are a committed group that want to drive improvements on behalf of all St Cuthbert's students. We have been particularly busy in the first term as we really wanted to make a mark as well as leading by example, and working hard for our recent mock exams.

Mrs Jones invited us to be a part of the interview process for the Student Council and, as we will be working closely with the student council and listening to them, we jumped at the chance. This was a fantastic opportunity for younger students to get involved and have their say, and we enjoyed meeting you and hearing your ideas.





Curriculum area - R.E.

We had an exciting start to the year in RE as we welcomed Miss Burke and Mr Patten to the department.

In September, we launched the new curriculum across all of KS3. This curriculum is approved and directed by the Bishops of England and Wales. It covers lots of topics which give our students a deep knowledge of the Catholic faith and its history. It also allows them to see how religion can still impact on the world today and to consider their own world view.

We paused this curriculum temporarily during Interfaith Week so that we could cover some lessons based on other world religions. Our classes enjoyed learning about different beliefs, festivals and traditions from Judaism, Islam and Hinduism.

We were pleased with how well many of our Year 11 students approached their mock exams with maturity and commitment. We would like to remind you and them that intervention/revision sessions are available after school on Thursdays and there is a drop in available also on Thursday at lunchtime.

Philosophy Club on Fridays have proved popular. Students that attend grapple with 'big questions' such as "What is reality?" and "What are the limits of science?" Sessions this half term have been led by Glenn Skelhorn from the Royal Institute of Philosophy. Students who have completed the course should receive a certificate and book at the end. We thank Glenn for his time and hope students continue to enjoy the sessions.

We are looking forward to the year ahead and working alongside you and your children to help them make progress and to enjoy their learning. We would encourage students to get involved in the different activities we have available within the RE department and Chaplaincy groups.

Curriculum areas — English

What's new in English for 2024-2025?



In English, we are fortunate to read many books, plays and novels, which introduce us to a range of different characters and settings, and in doing so, introduce us to people we have never met and places we have never been to, all designed to deliver important messages to our students. This year we have launched our new Key Stage 3 curriculum, in Years 7 to 9, which centres around a range of high-quality, engaging novels.

In Year 7, students have been focusing on the origins of story telling by reading and analysing a range of myths from various cultures, with a particular focus on Greek myths. In Year 8,

students began the year with a focus on *Shakespeare's The Tempest*, before reading *Animal Farm by George Orwell*, closely analysing the characters and themes introduced in Orwell's classic novel and understanding the message it gives about Power and Corruption. Year 9 have been studying Gothic Literature beginning with a focus on *Wuthering Heights by Emily Bronte*, before moving on to read a more modern-day classic *The Woman in Black by Susan Hill*.



The texts chosen for the new scheme of learning are designed to challenge our students, due to the recognised standard of stylistic quality they offer, their cultural or social significance, and their intellectual value. They also expose students to a range of ambitious vocabulary, which helps to improve their reading and their skills as a writer, as they are able to use their newly discovered vocabulary, to improve the quality of their own writing.



Meanwhile, in Key Stage 4, our Year 10 students have made an excellent start to their GCSE studies. We are currently reading *A Christmas Carol by Charles Dickens* (an appropriate text to read at this time of year) which forms part of the English Literature GCSE syllabus. Students have been grappling with the transformation of Scrooge, which is an important message in the novel, and a poignant reminder to us all as a Christian community to be more caring, at this time of year.

Year 11 have already undertaken a full set of English Mock examinations (4 papers in all) and should be commended for the way they approached these exams, as should their teachers, who worked tirelessly to mark these exams, whilst also managing the day-to-day teaching of lessons. A series of intervention and revision sessions will now be introduced in January, in response to Mock examination results, in preparation for the next set of mock examinations and the GCSE exams in the summer.



It has been a really busy and successful start to the year and we look forward to the new year and the new novels we will be introducing our students to.

Phonics

A big well done to all the students who are new to, or are ongoing in their learning journey, by taking part in the Abigail Steel Phonics Reading Programme. We continue to be impressed with the dedication, enthusiasm and effort you are showing in developing your phonic knowledge to enable you to improve reading fluency. As we all know, reading is an important lifelong skill and there are many stages involved that contribute to becoming a confident and fluent reader. Improving your reading ability, by using a phonic approach also supports with writing and spelling. As the famous quote by Dr. Seuss from the book; "I Can Read With My Eyes Shut!", states; "The more that you read, the more things you will know. The more that you learn, the more places you'll go."

Curriculum areas - Mathematics

We have been absolutely delighted by the incredible efforts our students have put into their personalised Sparx Maths Homework this year.

An impressive 441,602 questions have been answered correctly, 3282 hours of personalised learning completed and 416 students have improved at their timetables.



The whole Maths department has seen an improvement in students knowing and remembering more. We hope all students are proud of what they have achieved so far this academic year and would like to thank parents and carers at home for the support they have given.

You may have seen on our socials that we celebrate class and student of the week each week. It has been lovely to see so many students become involved in some good-hearted competition. There have been many excellent individual performances, but here are the top 3 performers in each year in terms of XP (the electronic rewards given for completing Compulsory Homework, XP boost, Target and Independent Learning) as of 30th November 2024.









Curriculum areas - Science

The Science topics we have been studying this half term link to exciting Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics (STEM) careers that students can consider for their future.

In Physics, Year 7 have been learning all about energy and electricity which inspires interest to consider aspirational careers in our ever-evolving energy sector, as we transition to using more renewable energy resources (away from finite non-renewable resources) and designing innovative engineering solutions to global challenges. Engineering, maintenance, control engineer of national grid infrastructure, project management of energy networks and web development roles.



In Biology, Year 8 have been studying reproduction and digestion which links to commercial plus NHS careers in; medicine, nursing, midwifery, fertility, nutrition, dietician, digestive disease specialist, food scientist and oncology opportunities.

In Chemistry, Year 9 have been learning all about the reactivity series of metals which links to shortage careers in chemical engineering across a wide variety of industries. Metals make up most of the periodic table of elements and never more have they been so useful, especially with the development of more efficient batteries and the displacement of metals in industry.

Year 10 have been studying a chemistry topic that unpicks the mechanics of chemical bonding and structures of substances, detailing the types of bonds formed between non-metals and between metals and non-metals. Chemical Engineer, Materials Scientist and Research Scientist are all prestigious careers that this topic links to.



Year 11 have been studying forces and motion, a physics topic (either side of the mock exams in Biology, Chemistry and Physics), which links to careers such as; Architecture, Civil Engineering, Mechanical Engineering, Car Design, Racing Car Driving, Police Force, Space Scientists or Technologist, Science Teaching and many more.



After Christmas, the Science department have a few experiential learning trips planned, taking learning outside of the classroom, aiming to enrich students with fresh perspectives of the subject and to develop a greater appreciation of its

application in the wider world around them.



Curriculum areas - Art

This term has been an exciting and inspiring one for our Art students, with a wide variety of projects that have showcased their creativity, technical skill, and individual expression. Here's a look at some of the work our students have been doing in Art:

Year 9 students focused on art appreciation this term, developing a deeper understanding of different artistic

movements, styles, and techniques. Each student researched an artist or art movement that inspired them and created artwork reflecting their findings. This project allowed students to delve into the rich history of art, examining works from

Year 7 students embarked on a personal journey with their 'All About Me' portrait painting project. This project encouraged them to explore their own identities and express their uniqueness through portraiture. Students used a variety of media, including watercolours, fine liners and coloured pencils to create striking self-portraits. This project pushed students to think outside the box and embrace a more conceptual approach to their work, exploring themes of perception, emotion, and identity.

Our year 8 students have made a fantastic start to the year. Last term they studied the importance of UK rivers and how they are managed to stop the impacts of flooding. This term they are understanding our economy and the decisions involved in making economies grow to their full potential.

The year 9 students have started the year off by studying how ice has shaped our landscapes here in the UK and across the globe. This term they have started to understand the concept of development and the way in which development is measured. An exciting opportunity for the year 9 students is coming up to take part in a project with "The Young Green Briton Challenge". Information was given out at an assembly on the 22.11.2024. with students able to take part in this exciting opportunity in the new year.

A massive well done to our Y10 students who have made a positive start to their GCSE studies in geography. Looking for a family day out over Christmas? Look no further!

The beach at Crosby is full of artefacts that date back to the time of World War 2 and beyond. Liverpool was bombed during the Blitz and as part of the clean-up process for the city, the rubble from buildings that had been destroyed was gathered up and deposited in the sea nearby to act as defence against sea weathering and erosion. For this reason, Crosby beach earned its nickname 'Blitz Beach'. If you visit Crosby beach you will find piles and piles of rubble on the sand which has been washed up over time. Old brick work, masonry from buildings, ceramic tiles and ceramic bathroom fittings as well as lots of sea glass can be found, all of which have a lovely smooth exterior due to it being tumbled in the sea for years and then eventually being deposited on the beach. It's a lovely glimpse into local history which allows your imagination to run away thinking up stories about where these washed-up artefacts came from.

We will visit La Sagrada Familia, a sacred church that has been in construction for over 100 years and is yet to be completed, the old town of Barcelona, La Boquería traditional market and Port Aventura theme park, alongside trying out Spanish food and Tapas and practising our Spanish language. We are really excited to be able to share this experience with our students.







Curriculum areas - Technology and Food

Year 10 GCSE Food Preparation and Nutrition Class Triumphs in Sensory Analysis Challenge

In a delightful and educational turn of events, the Year 10 GCSE Food Preparation and Nutrition classes took part in hands-on sensory analysis sessions that left students and staff buzzing with excitement. This challenging yet fun activity involved tasting and comparing a variety of popular snacks, drinks, and fresh produce, all with the aim of honing their sensory testing skills. The students approached the task with great seriousness and enthusiasm, learning about the intricacies of evaluating food products based on their taste, texture, smell, and appearance.

The session began with a much-anticipated taste test of different brands of Jaffa Cakes, a beloved snack that sparked lively discussions. Students took careful notes, evaluating the sponge, the chocolate coating, and the tangy orange filling in a blind tasting format. "It was amazing to see how small differences in texture and flavour can make such a big impact on what we like," said one student. The exercise helped them understand how sensory tests can provide valuable insights into food product development and consumer preferences.

The next challenge involved comparing different digestive biscuits—a staple in many households. Students examined the texture, flavour, and sweetness of two brands, using their sensory skills to find the odd one out. This activity not only enhanced their understanding of sensory analysis but also encouraged critical thinking and attention to detail.

The much-loved "Coca-Cola Challenge" followed, where students were tasked with distinguishing between regular Coca-Cola and Coke Zero; the sugar-free version. Each student closely observed the appearance, aroma, and taste of the drinks, taking care to note even the slightest differences in sweetness, carbonation, and aftertaste. "It was harder than I thought to pick out the differences between them," one student confessed, "but it helped me learn just how important all the sensory aspects are in creating a product people love."

Throughout the activity, students were guided in the use of various sensory tests, such as triangle tests, ranking tests, and hedonic scales. They also learned the importance of controlling variables to ensure fair and accurate results, a skill that will prove invaluable in their GCSE.

"This activity was an absolute success," said Mrs. Holden-Locke, the Food Preparation and Nutrition teacher. "It allowed students to apply theoretical knowledge in a fun and engaging way. They were able to experience first-hand how sensory analysis plays a crucial role in food development and how it can shape consumer choices."

The lesson not only provided an enjoyable learning experience but also gave students an opportunity to develop a greater appreciation for the subtle differences in everyday food and drink products. For now, however, the Year 10 class can look back on their successful sensory journey, knowing they've learned something new and had a lot of fun in the process.


P.E. and Whole School Sporting Achievements

Our Provision

Special Educational Needs present in many different ways, and it is vital that the support we put in place helps students and addresses this.

Provision is individual to each student, depending on their needs and the presentation of their difficulties in school.

Provisions available at St Cuthbert's include:

- An Individual Education Plan (IEP), that is shared with all staff
- Our specialist SEN teacher, who works with specifically identified groups of students
- Access to sensory equipment, if required
- Social Skills group work or 1:1 sessions
- 1:1 support from a keyworker supporting targeted needs
- Access arrangements
- Completion of AQA Unit Awards to support curriculum progress and to develop life skills

Every child is different, so the support every child receives is different.

We strive to work with key stakeholders such as parents, carers and external agencies to ensure we are implementing the right adjustments to allow every child to achieve.

SEND Drop-ins

This academic year we have introduced SEN drop-in sessions.

These are aimed at giving parents and carers the opportunity to nip into school and have an informal conversation with a member of the SEN Team.

All are welcome to attend. Your child may already be known to the SEN team, or it could be you have some concerns you would like to discuss.

The drop-in sessions for Term 2 are:

The Melrose Centre

Mrs Brookes and the Melrose Centre staff support all students within the Melrose Centre.

Behaviour support is key in ensuring that all students have an equal opportunity within their educational setting and for their personal growth.

All staff make it their priority to ensure that students learn from their mistakes by having restorative conversations with staff and understanding how to make the right choices.

Students take part in Personal Development sessions while working in the behaviour base to re-educate them.

Mrs Cleary and Mr Costello work within the Appropriate Provision (AP).

Appropriate Provision supports young people by providing specialist places for those who would benefit from spending time away from their current mainstream school or who present with such needs that cannot/can no longer be met in a mainstream school environment.

Benefits of Appropriate Provision: personalised learning, smaller class sizes and holistic support.









The students in our AP have been participating in charity work, working with the Northwest Air Ambulance Charity via NCS.

The students have created their own style of Christmas Cards to raise money for this amazing charity.

AP students benefit from Sacred Time - where they ask for the compassion to care for each other, the commitment to strive for excellence, and the courage to do the right thing.

On Fruit Friday, we have a chance for AP staff and students to reflect on their week and to try new and exciting fruits that will tickle their taste buds.





The Farne Centre

Our Farne Centre provides a wealth of support for our students. Here are some of the services we offer:

1-2-1 mentoring support – students attend The Farne to access 1-2-1 support for various reasons. This is done through a referral system in school from pastoral staff. Students usually have a weekly meeting to discuss worries or issues that they have identified.

Group work - group work sessions also take place in The Farne, covering a wide variety of topics including social and emotional support . These sessions also take place weekly for students who have been identified by pastoral/SEN staff for needing some extra support.



EDClass – is a new online platform, used in exceptional circumstances, where students can access curriculum work with qualified teachers on hand to support them. Students working in The Farne will have access to this and work independently on academic tasks. This programme is DfE accredited.

Transition support - The Farne staff are involved in the transition process from year 6 into 7, and year 11 into Post-16. Students identified as possibly needing support in year 6 are offered additional transition support. This involves students coming into school to do some extra settling in activities in The Farne and getting to know the staff who they will work with when they start in year 7. Transition support for Post-16 includes college visits to specific areas that the students would like to look at in preparation for applying to college.

New starter support – If a student joins St. Cuthbert's during the academic year, they will initially start in The Farne so that we can welcome them and allow them to complete assessments before they are fully integrated enabling them to receive a smooth and positive transition.

Young Carers support – The Farne offers 1-2-1 support for identified Young Carers in school. Our designated Young Carers Lead, Ms Tierney, is on hand to support students, enabling them to talk about their caring role.

Attendance support – for some of our students, getting into school can be challenging. In order to support these students, they may be based in The Farne working on a bespoke package.

Break and lunch drop in – students have access to board games, laptops to do homework. They also enjoy chatting with friends in a quieter environment. Support from mentors is on hand if anyone is needing to talk to someone if they have any issues or worries.

Promoting Mental Health In School

Here at St Cuthbert's, we are extremely committed to promoting positive mental health and wellbeing. We have regular year group assemblies surrounding mental health awareness, encouraging students to speak up if they are in need. Our pastoral team support our students to ensure they are receiving the highest level of support available. We also have our Farne Centre team who provide a comfortable, safe and peaceful space for students, offering advice and guidance and helping with a variety of issues. In our 'Personal Development' curriculum, we look at topics such as Mindfulness to ensure students are aware of different ways that they can look after their mental health and wellbeing. We encourage our students to take the '5 Steps to Wellbeing' through: connecting with others, being physically active,

learning new skills, giving to others and by paying attention to the present. If anyone is struggling inside and outside of school, we also have numerous resources on our 'Extra Support' section of the school website (under Students section), including phone numbers and how to reach them.

New School Counsellor

From September, we welcomed our new full- time School Counsellor, Miss Jeffers, who is here from 8am until 4pm every day. She offers drop-in sessions for the first and last hour of the day for students who need urgent support, and has half an hour/1-hour appointments during the school day with students who have been referred. Since September, Miss Jeffers has worked with 56 students on an appointment basis and handles our referral process.

Mindfulness Group

As well as holding drop- in sessions and scheduled sessions, Miss Jeffers runs a 'Mindfulness' group on a Monday at 3pm until 4pm. There are different activities taking place every week in this group. For example, we look at coping strategies for anxiety, and mindfully being able to ground ourselves when dealing with overwhelming thoughts. Each year The Farne Centre provides a range of opportunities for our students to explore the broader community. These experiences include trips focused on independent travel to city centres as well as smaller college visits, all designed to help students prepare for adulthood.



Visits to Acorn Farm offer our students with special educational needs (SEN) and social, emotional, and mental health needs (SEMH) an accessible way to build essential life skills while enjoying a hands-on experience with nature.

Animal therapy has been shown to provide comfort, reduce anxiety, and enhance emotional wellbeing. During our farm visits, students have the chance to interact with animals such as rabbits, chickens, and goats and other farm yard animals. Guided by trained representatives, these interactions help students learn to care for others, build trust, and develop empathy in a natural and rewarding setting. The physical and emotional benefits of interacting with animals supports students' ability to connect with others, work through challenging emotions, and develop

their confidence.

Another valuable aspect of our farm visits is meeting the adults with disabilities who work in various roles around the farm. These representatives, from animal caretakers to grounds keepers, are not only vital to the farm's

operations but also serve as wonderful role models for our students. By seeing adults with disabilities succeeding in meaningful work, our students see first-hand that everyone can contribute in unique and important ways. These role models demonstrate resilience and self-belief for our students, showing them the diverse ways, they can pursue their own goals.

Our students benefit from a blend of structured activities and independent play time on the farm. After spending time meeting the animals and learning about how they're cared for, students are given free time to explore safe, designated play areas. Structured activities allow students to discover new interests, practise active listening and taking turns when handling animals. Facilitating time for play promotes social communication, making good choices and being a part of a team. The farm's supportive environment enables our students to safely step outside of their comfort zones and feel a sense of freedom and exploration.

Through these farm visits, our students are building skills that will serve them in all areas of life. By connecting with animals, students are learning compassion and responsibility. By meeting inspiring representatives, students can see the various ways people contribute to community, and through structured play students organically practice important social and life skills. We hope this gives you a glimpse into the wonderful experiences and growth opportunities our students are gaining through these visits.
